Paul van der Velde, co-founder of ICAS and Secretary of International Convention of Asia Scholars (ICAS), hereby gives his weekly contribution on ICAS 5 in the year 2005.

A short summary

The Institute of Occidental Studies (IKON) and the Institute of Malay and World and Civilization (ATMA) of the University Kebangsaan Malaysia (UKM) teamed up to organize ICAS 5 for which the theme 'Sharing a Future in Asia' was picked. The Minister of Higher Education of Malaysia wrote in his welcome word: 'The hosting of ICAS 5 is very timely, held at a defining moment when we are embarking on a new path and transforming the country's higher education system to make Malaysia the regional center for educational excellence.' ICAS 5 also coincided with the celebrations of 50 years of independence which furthermore connected to the Visit Malaysia Year 2007.

For the first time ICAS took place in a Convention Centre, the Kuala Lumpur Convention Centre, which is located in the Kuala Lumpur City Centre (KLCC). From the centrally located exhibition hall one had a clear view on the famous Petronas Twin Towers. The nearly forty exhibitors at the ICAS book fair had no reason to complain both in terms of view and number of visitors. The book fair was a fixed feature of ICAS since the beginning, but in Kuala Lumpur it became mature. In cooperation with the city of Kuala Lumpur a circular bus line connecting places of cultural interest was launched which operates till this very day.

The organizer of ICAS 5, Prof. Shamsul A.B.: 'ICAS 5 is the place where researchers of all categories, from various fields, coming from all over the world, but all interested in Asia, convene, interact and build networks to share their research findings and personal experience.' He went on by dubbing ICAS 'The Olympics of Asian studies'. That is why the ICAS Secretariat saw it as imperative for ICAS to remain a travelling conference in Asia, drawing special attention to local dynamics of the country or region where the convention is held. Also for the first the number of grouped panels (individual abstracts which are thematically put together on trans regional and transdisciplinary basis) was double the number of organized panels and roundtables. This combining pf organized and grouped panels resulted not only in an ideal match of top down and bottom up contributions, but it also yielded an amalgamation of many different paradigmatic approaches which gives ICAS its signature vibe.

The second ICAS supplement to the IIAS Newsletter, 'Academic Publishing Today' addressed the challenges and pitfalls of getting a book published. For the first time e-books were highlighted and a new IIAS initiative 'New Books Asia' was launched, which has gradually grown into the 'first review' website in Asian studies.

WELCOME MESSAGE FROM THE ICAS SECRETARIAT

Welcome to the fifth International Convention of Asia Scholars – ICAS 5! Also on behalf of the host, the Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia (UKM) and its two organizing institutions, the Institute of Occidental Studies (IKON) and the Institute of the Malay World and Civilisation (ATMA) we wish you a pleasant and fruitful stay in Kuala Lumpur, and more particularly at the venue of ICAS 5, the brand new KL convention center situated directly at the feet of the Petronas Towers in the heart of Malaysia's capital.

In the ten years of its existence ICAS will have brought more than 5000 academics together at five conventions where approximately 4000 papers will have been presented in little over a thousand panels. Behind these numbers lies a world of multiple interactions across borders and disciplines, sometimes resulting in new long term international co-operative research links. At present, in its 5th edition, ICAS has become one of the largest gatherings of Asia scholars in Asia.

The first convention in Leiden in 1998 was first and foremost conceived as a transatlantic event: a meeting place for European and American Asia specialists. However, once the convention was announced, enthusiastic reactions poured in, not only from the Atlantic world but also from Asia!

Nearly one thousand participants from 40 countries attended ICAS 1. More than 350 universities, institutes and organizations were represented. ICAS 2 was hosted in Germany's new capital –Berlin, and hosted by the Freie Universität in 2001. Here 800 participants from 35 countries contributed to the success of the meeting. In Berlin it was decided that the next editions of ICAS had to take place in Asia and with the slogan "The future of Asia Studies lies in Asia!" ICAS 3 moved to Singapore in 2003. The National University of Singapore (NUS) hosted more than 1100 participants distributed over 250 panels and stemming from 54 countries. The attendance of ICAS 4 in Shanghai (2005) appeared to be even higher than that of Singapore: 1200 participants, reading 1020 papers in 270 panels. The Shanghai Academy of Social Sciences acted as a host. For the first time the ICAS Book Prizes were awarded for the best studies on Asia in the field of the humanities and social sciences and for the best PhD. Now in its second edition prizes will be awarded in the categories mentioned above but a new category has been added: the Colleagues Choice Award.

Now in 2007, we are very proud to present you with the programme of ICAS 5. Our Malaysian host wishes to add to this convention the Leitmotif "Sharing a Future in Asia", a significant theme, which underlines the need for an increasing integration of Asia Studies. ICAS 5 offers more than 325 sessions with 1600 active participants from 40 countries. In total 125 panels have been submitted of which 85 organized and 40 institutional panels have been selected. Furthermore, 225 grouped panels have been formed on the basis of individual submissions. This combining of organized and grouped panels resulted not only in an ideal match of top down and bottom up contributions, but it also has yielded an amalgamation of many different paradigmatic approaches. Needless to say – this typifies the multidisciplinary and border transcending character of ICAS.

We are deeply grateful to our host, the Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia and in particular to Prof. Dr Shamsul and his wonderful team, for all the endeavors they made to turn ICAS 5 into a success.

We wish you all an inspiring convention in Kuala Lumpur and hope that many new research initiatives and co-operative links will flourish from ICAS 5!

ABOUT ICAS 5





This positive development among the scholars of Asian studies will be further enhanced through a dynamic and interactive platform at ICAS 5 in Kuala Lumpur.

The first ICAS was held in Leiden in 1998. The subsequent conferences were held in Berlin (ICAS 2, 2001), Singapore (ICAS 3, 2003) and Shanghai (ICAS 4, 2005). ICAS 5 seeks to continue the ICAS tradition and has selected "Sharing a Future in Asia" as its theme. Expecting the participation of over 2,000 delegates representing 60 countries, ICAS 5 will be held from 2 to 5 August 2007 in the heart of Asia, the Kuala Lumpur Convention Centre, Malaysia. 

Delegates who have reserved their rooms through the Official Travel Agent would be able to communicate with the agent at this counter pertaining to their stay.



KUALA LUMPUR MAP AND HOTEL











